




from the Chairpersons




So, what's NAS all about?



The National Adoption Service (NAS) is like the super-organiser of adoption services.

We work together with local authorities, charities, health and education services to make sure everything runs smoothly. Every one of the 22 local authorities in Wales are part of NAS, they group together into regions who find families for children who need



What's a local authority?
Local authorities are in charge of lots of important things like housing, social services, roads, and even waste collection in certain areas, like Bridgend or Caerphilly. They are a bit like a mini government for each area.

Apology for past adoption practices

The Welsh Government's Deputy Minister for Social Services apologised for some adoption practices that happened way back between the 1950s and the 1970s.

Adoption Barometer Report

This report gave us a big thumbs up, showing that adoption services in Wales are doing really well compared to the rest of the UK.

We had an amazing time at PRIDE Cymru, where we chatted with lots of people about adoption and heard some incredible stories.

New resources

Priority A: Finding the best families

We're always looking for the best families for children and young people who need them. This year, we got creative with how we spread the word about adoption. We even hopped on TikTok and Spotify to get people excited about adopting!

What we did:

- National Adoption Week 2023: We took our 'Choose Family' campaign to the next level, using social media to reach more people than ever before.
- Adoption Register for Wales (ARW): This is one of our 'go-to tools' for matching children and young people with their new families.
- Welsh Early Permanence (WEP): This programme makes sure children don't have to move around too much before finding their forever home.



Priority B: Great adoption support

Adoption is a big deal, and we're here to support families every step of the way. We're all about jumping in early to help and make sure that children and young people who've had a tough start get the support they need.

Highlights:

- **Support plans:** We created tailored support plans for 1,591 children and their families, helping them along their adoption journey.
- Pathway Service: Run by Adoption UK, this service gave 313 families peer and parenting support.
- Connect Service: This programme brought together 389 children and young people through fun activities, events, and even a Youth Council that helps shape what NAS does.



Priority C: Staying in touch with birth families

We know that staying connected with birth families is important for many adopted children and young people, so we're here to help them do that in a way that feels right.

What we did:

• Contact plans: Nearly all the children and young people we placed this year have a plan to keep in touch with their birth families, either through visits or letters.



Priority D: Making adoption records easy to access

We want to make it easy for adopted people to find out more about their past when they're an adult and ready.

Cool stuff we did:

New pilot service: This year, we started a great new service to help people who
were adopted before 1976 find their records and reconnect with their birth families.
 We're planning to help even more people next year!



Priority E: Keeping things running smoothly

We're all about keeping NAS and Foster Wales running like a well-oiled machine. We set up a new committee this year to keep everything on track and help us make the best decisions.

Fun fact:

 Online conferences: Through an organisation called CASCADE which is based at Cardiff University we helped them to hold an online conference called 'Reframing Adoption' with creative activities and webinars, and people from all over the world joined in!
