The Welsh adoption support commitment

Our vision is for all adopters in Wales to be supported at every step of their journey, whether at the start, when a child is placed, or later should issues or queries arise. We want you to feel confident that information or support will be available to you when you need it and from professionals with specialist knowledge of adoption and children's care needs.

The [National Adoption Service for Wales](#) (NAS) is committed to every adoptive family having the following:

A point of contact

You will have a person to contact in your [Regional Adoption Service or Voluntary Adoption Agency](#) both before and after the Adoption Order is granted.

Ongoing support from your Regional Adoption Team or Voluntary Adoption Service

Your child's needs will be different at different stages of their life. You can expect to get help and advice from professionals with specialist knowledge and experience in adoption at any point during their childhood.

Your adoption agency will be there to offer help if you need and want it. The adoption support needs of your child / ren will be reviewed by your agency as theirs, or your own circumstances change. They will either provide support directly or arrange for this to be provided by others where needed. They will share relevant information, let you know about events of

interest and tell you about any training that you, or those who support you, can access at different stages of your son or daughter's childhood and beyond.

Each adopted child is unique

Adopting a child is a life-changing decision. We will provide you with as much information as possible about the child/ren, their past and what the future may hold, so you can make an informed decision and be as prepared as possible.

You will have an individual appointment with the agency [Medical Adviser](#) will help you understand what your child's health is like now, how it may be in the future and how best to support them.

Every adopted child comes with their own history: to help your child to make sense of their [Life Journey](#), you will receive various materials including their [Life Journey Book](#) and a [Later Life Letter](#) within given timescales. There is guidance and support available to help you to

help your child to make sense of their story as they grow and develop.

You will be helped to manage any planned contact with members of the birth family when that will benefit your child.

The NAS Regional Adoption Services

All local authorities in Wales provide their adoption services through the [five regions](#) of the National Adoption Service for Wales

Each region has a dedicated adoption support team that will provide you with advice and information, carry out assessments of adoption support needs and provide a range of support services themselves or in partnership with others. If required, they will refer to other specialist services.

The Voluntary Adoption Agencies

Voluntary adoption agencies also provide advice and information as well as providing support services to adoptive families. If required, they will support you to access services via regional services.

Support services provided by Regional Adoption Services in partnership with Voluntary Adoption Agencies

Therapeutic, Education and Support Services in Adoption (TESSA)

Should you need it, you will have access to the TESSA service – an early intervention support service offering peer support from experienced adopters and specialist professionals.

Your child will have opportunities to meet with other adopted children and young people aged 7 – 25yrs. to access support on a regular basis via '[Connected](#)' groups, located across Wales.

NAS underlying philosophy

A ONE team approach: Regional Adoption Services, Local Authority teams and Voluntary Adoption Agencies working together as a team around the child and family.

The Adoption Community: becoming part of a valued, Wales wide, adoption community with access to peer support as well as specialist professional advice and services.

Targeted or specialist services: prompt and equitable access to specialist services if required.

Communication and involvement: keeping you informed and consulted in developing adoption support services, so that they are responsive to existing and emerging needs.
